CCA Friends,

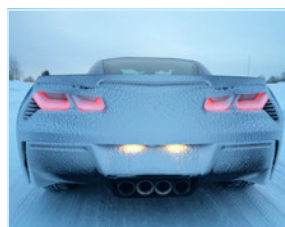

- Prospective members have to attend at least two membership meetings along with participating in three activities before applying for membership.
- The Hospitalization & Bereavement policy has been updated as approved by the Board at the September Board meeting.

Very few of you (if any!) will read the SRPs all the way through, but it is an excellent resource for answers to basic questions about CCA policies.

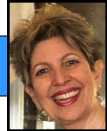

Treasurer's Report: By the Numbers

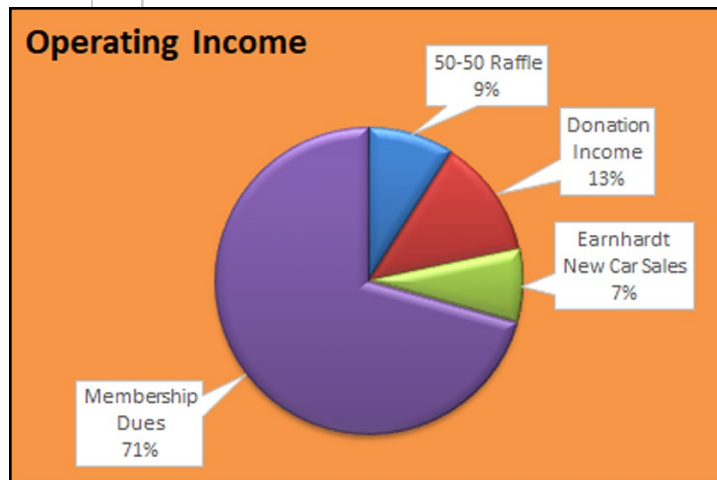
As I conclude my tenure as Treasurer, I thought I would spend a little time explaining the income and expenses of the club in an effort to help you better understand how money is utilized in the operation of the club, and in funding various club activities.

Before I get started, I first want to give a big thanks to **Susan Lovino** for volunteering to take over the Treasurer responsibilities for 2019. I have no doubt that Susan will do a great job. I also want to thank the Board members from the past three years for putting up with me. From requests for receipts, to pushing back on spending (and everything in between), I hope you realize it was all done to ensure that there is full accountability regarding the club's finances.

Now on to the good stuff. Overall, the club tries to operate year-to-year on a close to break-even basis. That is, don't spend too much more than we take in, and don't get cheap in applying funds to activities that benefit club members (e.g., reduces cost, enhances enjoyment). For 2018, club expenses outpaced income by ~\$401, which is actually very good given we incurred expenses greater than that with our IRS filing earlier in the year (i.e., we don't expect to ever see this expense again going forward).

Let's start out by looking at the various income sources for the club. Operating income comes from sources that are generally predictable (dues, 50/50, outside contributors). Event income comes from sources that are less predictable and highly variable. Take a look at the Operating Income chart. Here you see the various sources of income, and the percentage of the total they represent. As with most clubs, annual dues are the greatest source of income. The second highest source of income comes from a single source: Russo & Steele. For each of the past two years we have received a generous \$1000 donation for our volunteer work at their January auction. Now you might think of

this as event income – and I could have gone that way. But to me, it's not a CCA event because we don't organize/operate it – we are participants, and for our participation they make a donation. I hope all our members see just how important it is to continue to support Russo & Steel every January (even if for a few hours). Failure to do so would mean we risk losing this sizable income. Earnhardt Chevrolet provides us with \$100 every time a member (or a referral from a member) buys a vehicle from their dealership. The last piece of income is from the 50/50 drawings we hold at our monthly Membership Meetings. It's a nice chunk of change – and if you are like me and have never won, the club thanks you for your ongoing donations.



The other part of club income can come from club-related activities that involve collecting funds from members, and non-members. Traditionally, this has mainly occurred from our two Car Shows we hold annually. A number of years ago, it was decided that our spring car show, Corvettes In The Park, would become a show where all profits are donated to charity. This is a trend that has become popular with most car shows. This makes Corvettes In The Park a break-even club activity, although the Board could choose to add funds to the donation (e.g., rounding up to the nearest hundred). Our fall car show, Chevy's In The Park, does

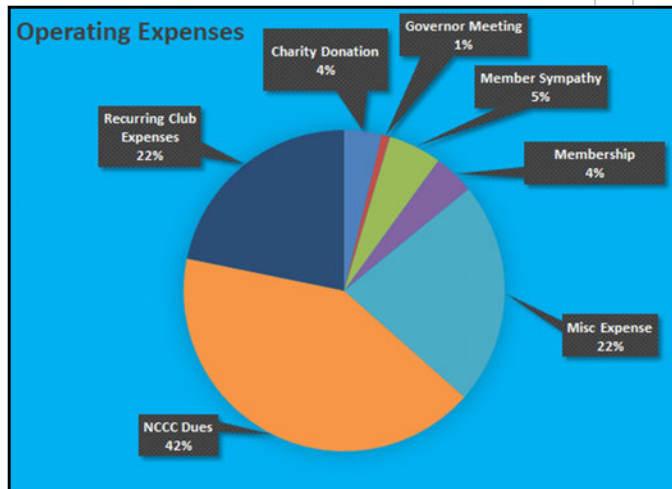

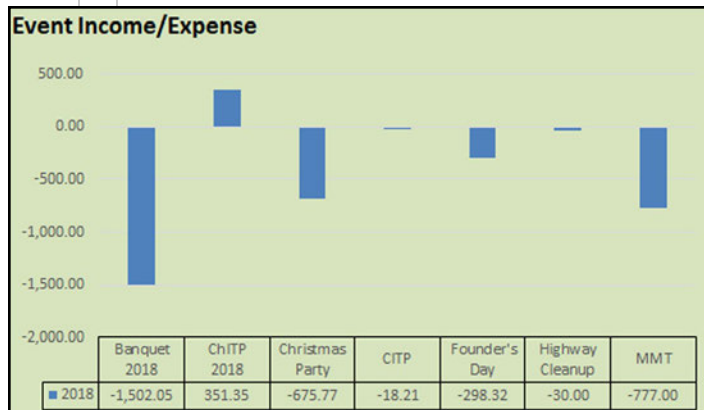
generate income for the club, although the amount of income has significantly dropped off now that CCA covers 100% of the costs associated with putting on the event (in prior years this was shared with our sponsor). For 2018, we took in ~\$350 from our fall car show. Now – we can significantly improve on this next year by getting more cars to our show. Since we've been getting about 100 cars registered for the show, the club could see between \$15-\$20 of additional income for every car registration over 100. Next year – consider what you can do to get more cars registered for our car shows.

associated with our IRS Filings for the Corvette Club of AZ, purchase of club banners and signs, and the purchase of supplies like raffle tickets and stamps. Membership expenses are costs associated with bringing on new members, typically badges and gift certificates. Member Sympathy and Charity Donation are the costs of flowers and/or donations provided to a club member. Governor Meeting is where I keep track of expenses we reimburse to our NCCC Governor for attending NCCC meetings held throughout the year.



The Event Income/Expense chart below, provides some details on how income is utilized (or gained) through the various major/recurring activities the club organizes during the year. Generally referred to as a subsidy, funds are provided to these activities in an effort to reduce the overall event cost, and/or enhance the overall event experience. How much the Board chooses to subsidize an event is a combination of historical data, our financial position entering the year, and any financial impact (plus or minus) we anticipate for the coming year (e.g., the subsidy for the annual Recognition Dinner, formerly the Banquet) will be significantly reduced in 2019).

Moving on to the expenses for the club, the Operating Expenses chart above, gives a breakdown of the percentages for each category of expense. As membership dues are our largest source of income, NCCC dues are our great expense. Every time you renew your membership, the club retains \$50 as income, with the remainder (either \$25 or \$35) going to NCCC. Recurring Club expenses are items that generally happen year after year at a mostly fixed rate. A few examples are our club storage unit payments (including insurance), website maintenance, subscriptions, and corporate filings. I use the Misc Expense category to capture expenses that happen occasionally but generally apply to the overall operation of the club. A few examples that occurred in 2018 were the fees

and expense point of view. At the beginning of each year, a full accounting of the prior year is put together and audited by a member of the club. This audit includes bank statements and receipts (and/or any supporting docs like emails), along with quicken reports detailing all transactions. If there are any discrepancies, incomplete reports, or questionable transactions, a report is provided to the board for corrective action.

And with this, I look forward to seeing you at a future member meeting – from the back of the room!

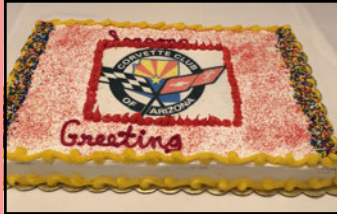
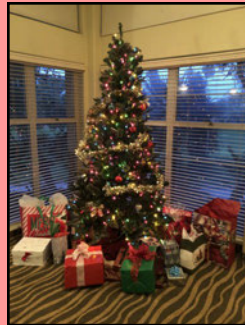

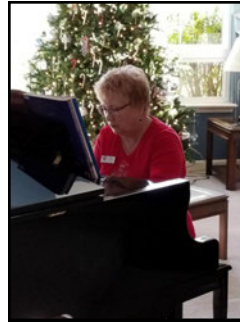


Activity Team Open House for 2018 Event Hosts by Esther Enriquez

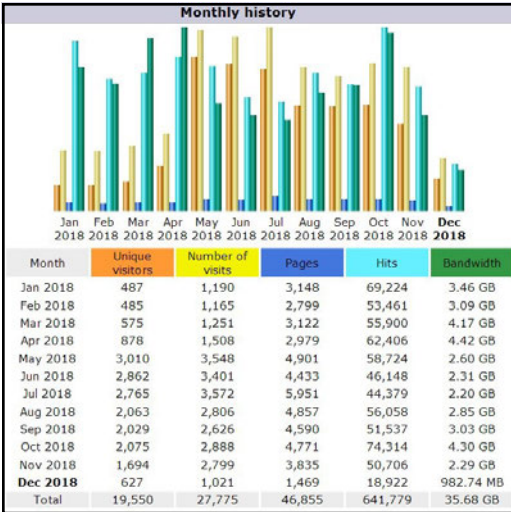


Webmaster's Corner

Seasons Greetings from your outgoing CCA webmaster! As Dom Lovino prepares to take over the website reins in 2019, I thought it would be a great time to review our site's statistics for 2018. The data presented below was accumulated starting in January, 2018 and runs through December 13, when this article was prepared. The December totals reflect a partial month.



It is interesting to see the monthly history graphic. Our monthly unique visitor counts range from a low of 485 to over 3,000 per month, and the number of pages viewed from 2,799 to 4,901.

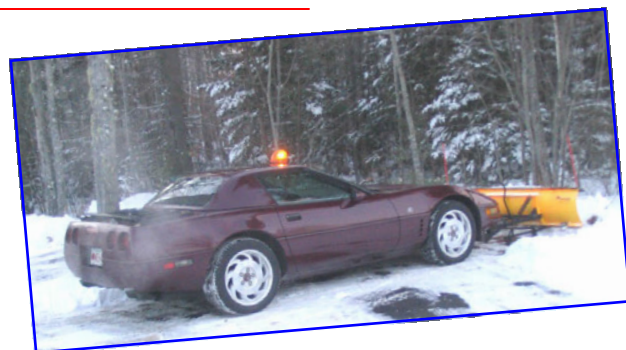

Mystery Member D



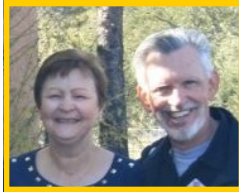
- 1. One of the most important things I've gained from joining CCA are the friendships I've made. The warmth of those friendships has grown over the 3+ years I've been in the Club.

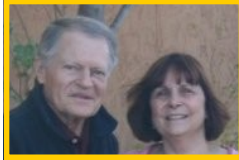
Globe Besh Ba Gowah Driver by Marc Teixeira

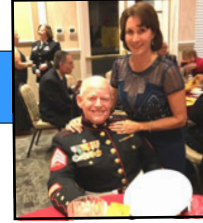
Route 77 from Globe to Saddlebrooke has wonderful scenic views as elevation changes take you from the high desert to the lower desert of the Tucson area.

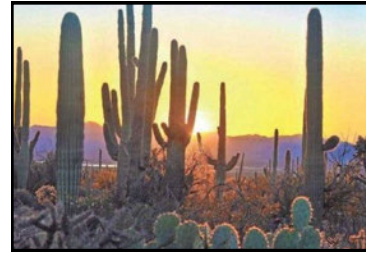

Mid-Engine C8 Corvette Update

Mid-Engine C8 Corvette Debut Likely For Summer 2019

Previously, *GM Authority* broke the news that the 2019 North American International Auto Show would not play host to the mid-engine C8 Corvette's debut. In fact, we also learned and exclusively reported the car had been delayed six months due to electrical issues.

When will the mid-engine C8 Corvette show up? Likely summer of 2019, according to our sources close to the matter. *GM Authority* can confirm a major auto show will not star the debut of the highly anticipated sports car. Instead, look for the mid-engine Corvette to have its own standalone reveal.



Thus, a total re-engineering effort of the electrical system is underway, which also means GM must coordinate with suppliers to tweak parts and components for production at the Bowling Green assembly plant.

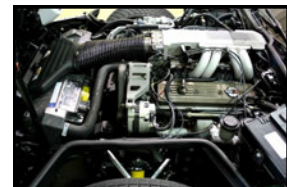
