Elaine received an inquiry from a governor that expected when Blue Bars was finished being published, that each member would receive an email with the link to Blue Bars. That is not the way it works. They need to go to the website and from there your member(s) can download Blue Bars if so desired. Please make sure your members are aware of this option and the process required if they want to download Blue Bars.

Jim Walton NCCC Business Manager: Regarding insurance, again all of you have been doing a great job. I received a couple of minor incident reports, but no real claims, and this is really good. We do have a new set of FAQs' on the website, these are basically a regurgitation of what was out there before. If you have any questions about our insurance, Jim Walton NCCC Business manager is the one to contact.

Linda & Dave Goebel – NCM Ambassadors: We are not to call the new Corvette a "C8," it is the "Next Generation Corvette". The plant is now producing about 175 C7 cars per day, and the paint shop is now totally robotic. It is a totally different kind of plant. From what we had in the past. We headed to Payson, North on Ellsworth through Usery Pass to Bush Highway. We drove by the Salt River and the many "tubers" and past




