

Larry Maiorano has been a CCA Member for many years. He has two Corvettes, but he also has several other cars of real interest to automotive enthusiasts. Plus, Larry's amazing collection of Automobilia is worthy of the attention of any observer of the automotive industry. Larry's career with Chevrolet gave him a front row seat to much of the late twentieth Century excitement of the Chevrolet Division of General Motors and of the Automotive scene on the west coast.

The event at his collection started as a desire from friends to see some of his cars and automobilia. It developed into a wonderful tour and discussion of all of Larry's stuff. About 30 of us gathered at his house around 10:00 on May 7. We started in Larry's shop where he has three of the best examples of 20th Century vehicles in town. A 1953 Jaguar XK120 Fixed Head Coupe, a 1968 Jaguar E Type, and a 1934 Chevrolet Hot Rod. All wonderful cars, each nice enough to be in a museum - but all street-driven often by Larry. You can see by the pictures that the shop has many great pieces of automotive interest throughout the building as well.

My NASCAR Day

On May 21st, I decided to use my discounted invitation from Phoenix Raceway. Even though the cost was high, I decided to give the experience a try. I signed up for 9am but was later asked to move to a noon start. It seems their on-line sign-up allows overbooking. When I got out of my Corvette, the temperature was 88 °F. I found my way to Check-in at the blue merchandise hauler. I traded my driver's license for a Racing License card. We went from the Midway staging area to a meeting room to watch the orientation and track safety video. We put on our driver's suits before we returned to the track.



The driver's meeting was back at the Midway station. The Experience supervisor warned the drivers about the infractions that would cause their experience to beforfeited. You can have your car pushed to speed so you could drop the clutch toget to 4th gear. If you stalled the car twice on you way to 70 mph in 4th gear before the Sunoco sign, you forfeit. You can have your car pushed to speed so you

could drop the clutch toget to 4th gear. If you stalled the car twice on you way to 70 mph in 4th gear before the Sunoco sign, you forfeit. The rev limiter prevents the drivers from going too fast. If you exceed the rev limiter, the exhaust crackles. If you exceed it too many times, you could forfeit your Experience. You need to drive 5 feet higherthan the inside yellow line and 10 feet awayfrom the outside wall (the fence). The old PJ-1 coating turns to glaze after months in the sun, so stay away from it or you might crash their car. Everyone waits along the pit wall tents for their turn to get fitted with a helmet that is fitted with a 2 way radio. Unfortunately, they still had 6 drivers still there from the 11am class. The next delay was a red flag when an Indy car driver got a flat and hit the wall in turn 3. He was fine but it took an hour to clean it up and get the clearance from track safety and fire crew. After waiting 2 hours, I was fitted for my helmet. They tell you that should be comfortably "uncomfortable". After 20 minutes, I loaded onto the racecar.

I had to work hard to get both of my legs through the window, and slide down into the seat. My crewman checked my clutch compression, and had me slide forward to fit a 2" pad behind my butt. The clutch has a very strong spring, but I could hit the stop after the fitting. He clipped my HANS devise to my helmet and connected the radio connection. The spotter/instructor came in LOUD and clear (I wish I brought my ear protector plugs). He connected my 5-point harness and tugged the belts very tight. After he asked me if I was OK, he closed the window net. My spotter came on the air and said, "car 0, are you ready". I pushed the green button on the steering wheel for about a second and replied "10-4". My crewman turned on the ignition and the car fired immediately. Blipping the throttle made my Corvettes seemed tame. The 4-speed had a Hurst shifter and the ivory engraved ball that was just like my 57.



The Supervisor told us that the shift point is 3000. The launch point is about 1200 rpm. I watched my buddy stall his car. I launched fine, second gear was a little iffy, but 70 mph on the apron was no problem.





NASCAR Experience cont.

Getting onto the race track was difficult for me. I should have been on the track before the dog-leg. So I was entering turn 2 and needed to get off the apron. I did not remember what turn 2 or the pit entrance looked like other than the approach is blind. Kevin (my spotter) gave me the instructions I needed. So my first trip down the back stretch went well and told me to roll out of the throttle as I approached turn 3. I lifted and the car slowed quickly. Exiting turn 4, Kevin said to roll onto the throttle. Approaching the "choose box", he said to roll off the throttle until I lined-up the apex of the dogleg with the entrance to turn 1. I lifted the throttle and rolled through turn 2. As I passed the apex, I eased onto the throttle to enter the back straight. I was told me to speed up until I hit the rev limiter rpm. He said to back-off if I ever hear that again. As I continued my first 8 laps, I found that I could use a lot of throttle past the apex of turn 4 while moving out toward the wall. As I passed the apex of the dogleg, I rolled onto the throttle moving high as I left the apex. My spotter told me when to roll out of the throttle as I approach turn 2. Past the apex, I rolled onto the throttle while avoiding the outside that had the dark JP-1 coating. Soon after I was on the back straight, I passed the rev limiter rpm. The car came off thecorner so quickly, I was surprised how soon I could pass the rev limited rpm. I adjusted my driving style so as soon as I was on the back straight, I focused on the tach so I did not exceed 4700 rpm. After 8 laps, I rolled onto the apron and down pit lane maintaining 1000 rpm as I approached the staging area. I tested the brakes at the marker and shifted to neutral at the next marker. I stopped in my lane and the pit crew shutoff my engine and hung the steering wheel from a hookon the roll-cage. I was to wait in the car until they could get me out for my second set. I asked for a water and started thinking about what I wanted to do differently when I got back onto the track. I got the one to go. I was cooled down and calm. I launched onto the apron and quickly got to 3000 rpm. Kevin said to move onto the track and I headed for the outside limit. I rode the throttle past the apex of 2 and hit the rev limiter as I gotonto the back straight. Approaching turn 3, Kevin said to roll off the throttle. Instead of lifting, I rolled out of the throttle and kept the rpm up as I turned to position the left front on the first seam from the bottom of turn 3. Once on the seam, I rolled onto the throttle to increase my speed in the corner. The grip was amazing so at that point I knew I could stay out of trouble. I was going much faster with noticeably more G-load when Kevin told me to roll onto throttle. I didnot back-off as much after I passed the "choose box" and steered to the apex in the dogleg. I was using more throttle as I drove to the limit at the wall. I went past the turn 2 apex faster than ever and hit the rev limiter as soon as I was on the back-straight. I repeated this several times until Kevin said stay off the rev limiter 4750 rpm or he was going to pit me. From that lap on, I decided that the back-straight was a chance to relax and I never exceed 4500 rpm coming off of turn 2. I went to the blue hauler to get my driver's license and turn in my driving suit. It was 95°F and pulling off a wet driving suit was more work than driving the racecar. As I was driving out of the infield, I thought that was worth it. If Phoenix Raceway makes me the same deal next year, I should do 8 morelaps in a solid axle Chevrolet racecar. Maybe we could get more CCA Drivers out next time? Thanks for reading my story, Ron
